Acting CEO's Message



would like to take this opportunity to extend a sincere warm welcome to the readers of our newsletter and thank the staff of GJ Crookes Hospital and feeder clinics for their dedication and commitment in providing health care to patients in the midst of challenges caused by current economic climate in our country. The support from our Hospital Board, partners, and service providers for their continued efforts in making provision of quality health services to our clients and patients possible will never go unnoticed.

In 2022/23 all our strategies and efforts will continue to be aimed at reducing morbidity and mortality rates across all priority programmes and improving client Experience of Care.

High uptake of COVID 19 vaccine in Scottburgh and surrounding areas was made possible by working in partnership with Park Rynie Halfway Toyota. The Management of Halfway Toyota provided a vaccination site

in their premises from November 2021 to 31 March 2022. This gesture further strengthened the sound relations between the GJ Crookes Hospital and private sector in managing health catastrophes in our communities.

The devastating floods in April resulted in disruption of water supply in certain parts of North and South Coasts of KZN including GJ Crookes Hospital. In addition to Ugu Water that was overstretched due to high demand, the business and faith based organization namely Scottburgh Mosque and ABSA provided water for patients and staff until the water supply was restored.

Integration of COVID 19 management with other health services has been implemented as per National and Provincial directive and vaccination is now offered in all PHC streams including outreach services. There has been no dramatic improvement in the uptake of vaccination boosters compared to 1st and 2nd doses due to reluctance of clients in getting these boosters. Our teams continue to embark on various strategies to ensure that relevant groups of people are targeted for example by having interactive discussions with focused groups, and providing all services during official community events. It is also encouraging to notice a decline in COVID 19 admissions from the daily average bed utilization rate of >60% in January to between <2% and 0% in May and June respectively and we continue to monitor trends and adhering to updated guidelines.

Once more on behalf of GJ Crookes Hospital Management, I want to thank our staff both in PHC and Hospital settings for their hard work, "Courage is an inner resolution to go forward despite obstacles" Martin Luther King Jr.

Mr Baker also thanked the department for the good relationship they had within this period and was grateful for having had a hand in being of service to the community.











TB Awareness Day



On the 24th May 2022 the HAST Unit of GJ Crookes Hospital held a TB Awareness Day Event at the Outpatients Department. This event is held to raise awareness to communities that TB is one of the main killer diseases in South Africa as per statistics. It is also done to remember the people who passed away from this disease. During this event, people were informed that TB is preventable and curable. In addition health education about signs and symptoms, utilization of their local facilities and the importance of screening and testing was given. Adherence to treatment in preventing complications such as MDR, was emphasized during health education.

The program consisted of health education songs, and slogans to end TB. Following health education and presentations a question and answer session was done, where clients who provided correct answers would be rewarded with appreciation tokens.











Vaccination Focus Groups Sessions



Umdoni Health Sub District and Ugu Health District led by National Department of Health hosted a community dialogue with the Community of Umdoni for rapid assessment on vaccine hesitancy using Focus Group Approach. This group consisted of various community structures which included Health Care Workers, Community Health Workers, Community Care Givers, Youth, Religious and Traditional Leadership, Men Associations etc. Engagements were done from 28 – 31 March 2022 in all Sub-District Municipalities. In Umdoni Sub-District it was held on the 31st of March 2022. Many issues came out during the discussion which highlighted to the department of health representatives on why people are hesitant in taking the vaccine. The issue of the booster was outstanding as there were many concerns regarding it citing less information shared by the department about the booster vaccination. People who are taking chronic medication are also reluctant because of different reasons as they also access un-verified information from social media. The coordinators from the department of health shed light and understanding to all concerns raised and the importance to have the majority of the community vaccinated to prevent people from getting ill and dying from Covid-19













Provincial Nurses Day of Prayer



On the 12th of May 2022 Mrs Thathakahle Gumede who is an Operational Manager for Philani Clinic was a guest at the Provincial Nurses Day of Prayer invited by the MEC for health Ms. Nomagugu Simelane. ma week initiative which was a national call by Minister of Health Dr. Joe Phaahla. For these colleges, there were 362 students who came for screening services and 250 were vaccinated. Phuthuma week is a multidisciplinary, multisectoral approach in improving health outcomes terms of the following indicators: - Increasing uptake of COVID-19, influenza and other vaccines, bring clients back to care HIV and NCDs, call back treatment interrupters, tracking and tracing of clients defaulted on CCMDD program, integrated screening for both communicable and non-communicable diseases and health promotion etc. The main focus areas for the colleges were health promotion, health screening, Covid-19 Testing and Covid-19 Vaccinations. Mrs. Mathenjwa thanked Ms. Ncayiya, the campus managers and students for participating in the awareness.

An appreciation ceremony was conducted to extend how grateful management was for the effort that the staff members and stakeholders took in sustaining functions in the hospital.












Matron Sisoka's Farewell
