MMC PROGRAM IN GREYTOWN HOSPITAL

1.5 million mark reached in Medical male circumcision.

The MMC program headed by Clinical Nurse Practitioner, Sir TS Khanyile, has circumcised a total number of 401 beneficiaries during the reporting quarter. During the Budget Vote 7 of 2023, the Member of Executive Council (MEC) Nomagugu Simelane- Zulu mentioned that the KwaZulu Natal Department of Health (KZN DoH) reached the

1,5 million mark for Medical Male Circumcision (MMC). The MEC added during the budget vote that MMC has found to be an effective method for Human Immune Virus (HIV) prevention, as it reduces the risk of HIV infection for men by up to 60%. The MEC thanked all stakeholders involved in this milestone in the Province. Under Umvoti Subdistrict

camps are being held weekly on Fridays. Young boys are recruited all across the sub district by the MMC recruiter, the team circumcise them at the nurse home hall during a Friday afternoon. The team for MMC also circumsize walk in,

A total number of 60 boys are circumcised per week, the number varies according to the clients that have

confirmed and walk-ins, these boys are fetched by EMRS transport around their villages and later sent back to their villages there-after the MMC procedure. After the MMC there is also continuity of care for these beneficiaries, the team does follow up visits to clients and removes dressings, check on wounds and any other complication.

HOSPITAL HOSTS SUCESSESFUL TB DAY **AT NSELENI**







Tuberculosis (TB) month is commemorated every year during the 1st to the 31st of March every year, and TB day is observed on the 24th of March. Easter came early for the rural community of Enseleni in Greytown under ward 5 in Umvoti sub-district on the 21st of March 2023, the community of Enseleni benefited in a TB health outreach awareness day, which was held at the Enseleni community hall. Health officials from the Primary Health Care (PHC) component made sure that the community was screened for various health ailments. The Men's clinic a service which was recently launched at the beginning of the year by the Greytown hospital PHC was

also on site. A total number of 06 male beneficiaries who took advantage of the health outreach and accessed services. A total number of 40 TB screenings were done on that day. A total number of 19 Pap Smears were done, Child Health saw 15 clients. while Minor ailments saw 64 clients. They were 22 beneficiaries screened for HIV, the ongoing Measles jab was administered to 10 toddlers during this outreach, MMC demand creation was done onsite and 15 beneficiaries were recruited during this campaign, a total number of 400 condoms were distributed (male and female condoms) during the event. The importance of adhering to TB and ARV medication was also

highlighted on the day. The Greytown hospital management would like to thank all the members of staff that participated during this selfless outreach at Enseleni. And also to extend gratitude and appreciate the individuals and companies that made the day a huge success by sponsoring items needed on the day, all thanks to Assupol, Metropolitan, aQuelle, Mini Cash, Soekoe Motors, Govenders Motors, Mr Dumisani Ntuli and Mr Phumlani Langa, and also to our media partners Ikhwezi FM for radio slots and Greytown Gazzette for publicity and covering the

event. During the budget vote 7 of 2023, the MEC for Health alluded that the department will be getting more "TB Trucks" to aid in the diagnosis of TB.

- Unexplained loss of weight
- Fever of 2 weeks and sweating at night

UMVOTI SUBDISTRICT MEASELES AND HPV CAMPAIGN

The National measles and Human Papillomavirus (HPV) campaign kicked off during the 06 February to 31st March 2023, Immunization protects young children against potentially lifethreatening illnesses such as measles and HPV. The Greytown hospital and its feeder clinics immunization team administered the measles and HPV jab in the reporting quarter. Parents and caregivers, were urged to protect children by making sure that they get a jab during this year's campaign. Crèches and schools were visited by mobile teams to administer these vaccines, Primary Health Care facilities (PHC) also administered these jabs to protect our people and their families from these lifethreatening but preventable illnesses.

Measles is a highly contagious and easily transmissible disease caused by measles virus. Patients with measles present with fever and with a rash. The rash looks like small, red, flat spots that start on the face/head and then spread downwards over the body. The rash does not form blisters, nor is it itchy or painful. Other signs include cough, conjunctivitis (red eyes) and coryza (running nose). Complications of measles can include diarrhoea, dehydration, middle ear infection, brain infection (encephalitis), blindness and death. Complications are more serious in those who catch measles as young infants (under 2 years of age), in children who are malnourished and people who





are immunosuppressed.
Any person who is not (immune) vaccinated for measles can catch measles from an infected person.
Once a person has had measles, they are immune/ protected from the virus.



Vaccination is another way to become immune to measles. Vaccinated individuals are protected from severe symptoms of measles, mostly for the rest of their life. Communities become vulnerable to outbreaks of measles when more than 5% of persons are not vaccinated. The Department of Health urges communities to heed the call to vaccinate children during catch-up campaigns currently planned by the Department.
















WEMADODA SABELANI!

Greytown District Hospital continues to support the MEC initiatives such as the Men's clinic program. The Umvoti sub district continues to create more men friendly facilities through the Men's Clinic initiative at Primary Health Care facilities under the sub district. On Thursday the 23rd of February 2023, Men's health champion Sir Celani Sibiya urged young and old men from the township of Nhlalakahle to get tested for HIV, get circumcised and get screened for TB. Sibiya was speaking during the men's community dialogue initiative

which took place during the reporting quarter at the Nhlalakahle community hall. The officer also spoke on the men's clinic that is in operation at Primary Health Care facilities under Umvoti sub district were men can come in on Mondays for check-ups and health screening. The officer added that when men come to the facility they can expect to be seen by a male nurse (and not a female nurse), which the men at the gathering received with great excitement. Celani also said the program of the men's clinic is also rolled out

across the UMvoti Sub-District The official added that there are many issues that men go through and that this forum was crucial to creating a platform were men can speak out.

An ecstatic Mandla Sithole from the Nlalakahle township said he was pleased with the Department of Health's initiative of the men's clinic currently at Pine street clinic and added that as men they dread going to the clinic because they would normally get helped by female nurses which Sithole noted was rather 'awkward and

uncomfortable', he also said the lines at the facilities are also a challenge for them and was excited that in the men's clinic you are seen by a male nurse and there are no long gues. The men at the event were also interested on initiating on Pre Exposure Prophylaxis (PREP). The event was hosted by Harmony retreat an Non-**Government Organization** (NGO) funded by the Department of Social Development, awareness on the issue of drug dependency was also touched by social workers from the NGO.


The theme of the event was Freedom Day and Social Cohesion.


