#### New Devices Delivered for the CP Children

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> of August2 2023, the first order of standing frames was received from Timion <sup>®</sup>.

The standing frames are crucial in managing children with cerebral palsy who do not have the ability to stand independently.

The use of the standing frames at home will enhance the 24hrs posture management of these children.

There was much excitement at the clinic when 3 standing frames were issued the next day to the caregivers and patients.

According to Timion®, this was a breakthrough as QNRH was the first hospital in the province to be able to provide our patients with these devices.

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#### FOOD SERVICES UNIT AUDITS PERFORMANCE

On the 03<sup>rd</sup> of March 2023, which fell in the last quarter of the 2022/23 financial year, a peer review food services audit was conducted by a multi-disciplinary team from the district office. The team comprised of members from the following disciplines; Quality, IPC, Health and Safety, nutrition and Waste Management.

The aims of this periodic assessment was to measure the hospital's performance against a comprehensive set of food service standards, to reflect on current performance, quantify resource needs and to develop a supportive system to be used by all hospitals..

The facility achieved 90% in the audit, which is considered a Gold standard of compliance.

The assessment for the first quarter of the 2023/24 financial year was conducted on the 26<sup>th</sup>

May 2023, by nutrition directorate. The focus of the audit included the core elements of food service package namely finance and human resources, food handling and storage, hygiene and safety as well as menu cycle.

This audit showed an improvement from the previous assessment with the hospital scoring an outstanding 99.2%.

The hospital kitchen was out-sourced to Capitol Caterers back in 1994. 98% of staff employed in the kitchen fall under the service provider with only the Food Service Manager and one food service aid supervisor being employed by Queen Nandi Regional Hospital.

# Making a Difference in the Workplace

This was the theme for the year 2023 which aimed to

- 1. Inform people about working parent's perspectives on breastfeeding and parenting.
- 2. Anchor optimal paid leave and workplace support as important tools to enable breast-feeding.
- 3. Engage with individuals and organizations to enhance collaborations and support for breastfeeding at work.
- 4. Galvanize actions on improving working conditions and relevant support for breast-feeding.

The Dietetics team facilitated the hospital's commemoration of the 2023 Breastfeeding awareness campaign. The event was celebrated with working moms on the 02nd of August 2023 in line with the provincial theme. The day was informative with Ms Zama Khumalo a Prof Nurse from the hospital sharing her touching experience with breastfeeding while on duty.

She shared her experience and challenges on breastfeeding as a working mom as she

has a 2 years old who is still breastfeeding. According to Ms Khumalo, successful breastfeeding requires support from family and colleagues as well. Working as a nurse can be quite demanding. Sometimes she will be so busy that she will not get time to express. She appreciated her colleagues who always supported her and allowed her to go and express. Some will even remind her when it's time for her to express.

QNRH is committed to make breastfeeding in a workplace more feasible. Plans are in place to have a dedicated room for breastfeeding employees. It will include necessary equipment such as a fridge and moms will be comfortable to express in a relaxed environment. Ms Khumalo encouraged other moms to continue breastfeeding when they return to work as breastfeeding is very beneficial to their babies.

Mrs SL Lamula (EAP) spoke on behalf of HR and discussed the legislations and codes of practice that pertain to breastfeeding in the workplace. Staff appreciated the employers commitment to support breastfeeding employees.

# PAP SMEARS DRIVE AT QNRH

Cancer is the second-leading cause of death worldwide. 10 million people die from cancer every year. More than 40% of cancer-related deaths could be prevented as they are linked to modifiable risk factors such as smoking, alcohol use, poor diet and physical inactivity.

Dr Jayeshnee Moodley (Specialist Obstetrician and Gynaecologist ) from Melomed Private Hospital chose to do her community service at QNRH by offering 50 free pap smears. QNRH female employees were lucky to benefit from this initiative.

Results were to be sent to the individuals who participated. Staff members were extremely grateful to Dr Moodley and her team.





#### Why should we screen?

A screening for cancer can detect cancer at an early stage and may be easier to treat or cure.

#### How are female cancers treated?

Female cancers can be treated in several ways such as surgery, chemotherapy and radiation. Treatment depend on the kind of cancer and how far it has spread.

Cervical cancer and breast cancer were highlighted as the most common cancers affecting women. It was emphasized that these cancers can be cured if detected early. Women were encouraged to know their bodies and to screen by doing regular pap smears and mammograms as advised by health professionals.

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# **MAJOR DISASTER DRILL**

QNRH conducted its annual disaster drill on the 13th of September 2023. This year, the drill was a mock motor vehicle accident which aimed at testing the preparedness of the facility to handle multiple casualties as per the disaster management plan.

The drill was a real life scenario involving an accident between two vehicles one of which was a taxi transporting scholars. EMS, SAPS, Fire and traffic departments were part of the stakeholders involved. 15 casualties were triaged and transported to QNRH, the QNRH in search of the news breaking story. nearest facility. They were triaged according to red, yellow and green codes.

Casualties were assessed and stabilized by the medical team in GOPD before being transferred to tertiary hospital by EMS. Patients who were already at the

hospital at the time of accident were informed of the situation and were advised on the increased waiting time while doctors and nurses prioritised the critical patients from the accident.

The participation from doctors, nurses and all staff members showed that the hospital is adequately equipped to handle such a disaster. The drill was conducted so smoothly that they fooled the local journalists who followed the traffic response team to
