GAMALAKHE COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTRE HOLDS OPEN DAY

The Gamalakhe Community Health Centre held an open day event under the theme, "Shared vision improvement on areas of deficits and a 5 year sustainable goals" on the 25th November 2022. The health Centre's Deputy Nursing Manager, Thoko Ntuli said the purpose of the event was for a the community to know the Centre better in terms of the challenges and how the Centre can work together with the community to overcome the challenges.

Centre CEO, Dr. Frank Shongwe said they will strive to ensure that the community of Gamalakhe receives best quality care. Dr Shongwe said their main objective is to improve patient experience of care, reduce long waiting times and complaints related to the attitude of staff. He added that he has learned that there are number of complaints related to missing patients records saying that as a facility they have embarked on archiving all files that belongs to patients that visited the facility in the last 10 years in order to create more space. When the clinic was expanded as a CHC, the filling department was not extended.

Being a CHC means we are no longer seeing patients from Gamalakhe only but also from other catchment areas like Margate, Shelly Beach, Gcilima, KwaNzimakwe, Bhomela, Mvutshini and Port Edward. The facility wants to work with the communities to ensure that the Centre provides best quality service at all times. Dr Shongwe stated that staff members that fail to treat patients with care will be dealt with because poor service or staff attitude, ruins the facility image. How can you send

your family member and loved ones knowing that there will be treated badly? Asked Dr. Shongwe.

As management we want those complaints because this Centre is for the is for the community. We don't ant people leaving the facility because of staff members that do not know how to treat patients.

PRO, Mr. Radebe said residents are to follow the department complaints mechanism such as lodging the complaint and putting it inside the complaints boxes situated in every service area inside the premises or they can be forwarded to him or Dr Shongwe directly via email or by calling their offices, their contact details are also visible in all service areas.

Ms. Mthimkhulu from ward 26 said when ever she is sick she has been visiting a private doctor and it took her long to come to the CHC due to the negative comments from the community but her experience is amazing. She further requested management to add at least one CHW at Mgolombeni area.

Matron Ntuli pleaded the community to protect the community health workers as they face difficulties whenever they are working in the community as other house holds release dogs to chase them away.

Inkosi Mavundla from Gamalakhe tribal council thanked the management for the good relations that they have with the Community Health Centre and wished to be sustained. He further thanked the CEO for outlining the challenges faced by the CHC especially related to inadequate space for expansion of the CHC since the facility does not have mortuary and there is no space to file patients records. I have seen it by myself I would like this issue to be raised with the ward councillors and other stakeholders in order to support the centre, CEO. Inkosi Mavundla also raised concerned with the NPO's that are not known by the

WORLD AIDS DAY



GAMALAKHE CHC STAFF MEMBERS AND MASINENGE RESIDENTS DURING

amalakhe Community Health Centre commemorated World Aids Day on the 1st December 2022 at

the Siyaphambili Crèche in Masinenge under the theme "equalize and integrate to end Aids". The centre's Nonzaliseko Skhondo said no person should lose their lives due to the diseases since government gives out ARVs .

She said every patient that has tested positive for HIV/Aids must be enrolled on ARVs immediately. She added that if you are planning to have a family while you are HIV positive, your viral load has to be suppressed. She also said there are preventive measures to ensure that people are not infected with HIV such as Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (Prep) and condom usage. "If you were involved in an unprotected sex and you don't trust your partner, please visit the clinic within 72 hours in order to be issued with Post-Exposure Prophylaxis (PEP).

The PEP must be taken for 28 days. This pill is also recommended for someone who has been sexually assaulted, "she said. Meanwhile Gamalakhe Community Health Centre's PRO said the main aim of the commemoration was to support people living and affected by the HIV, and remembering the lives of people who died of the virus. "The combination prevention initiatives includes oral Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PREP) which is one pill taken every day to prevent HIV infection. It is an ARV taken before exposure to HIV. Then there is Post– Exposure Prophylaxis (PEP) which is an ARV taken after exposure which is taken within 72 hours but 28 days, to prevent HIV. Lastly, there are ARVs for people who tested HIV positive which is a lifelong treatment to minimize the effect of HIV, strengthen the immune system, reduce viral load and increase CD4 count, "he said, adding that during the commemoration in Masinenge a candle lighting ceremony was done to honour those who dedicate their lives in helping people who live with and are affected by HIV and continue to mobilize the community in solidarity.

Days of Activism for violence against women and children is the worldwide campaign to oppose violence against women and children. It aims to raise an awareness of the negative impact that violence and abuse have on women and children and to rid society of abuse permanently.

This campaign takes place from the 25th November to 10 December every year. However the success of this campaign rests on our individual and collective actions to safeguard society against this cycle of abuse.

On the 15th December 2022 Gamalakhe Community Health Centre held their own in order to educate men from the CHC and clinics about the abuse experience by women and children. Abuse is any form of behaviour that causes fear, bodily harm and forcing people to do things against their will.

This year's theme is "Socio— Economic Rights and Empowerment to build Women's Resilanceagainst Gender- Based Violence and Femicide: Connect, Collaborate, Contract!." Guest speaker, Mr Doctor Njoko who is the Chairperson of Men's Forum in Ray Nkonyeni said men must teach children values of gender equality and protect children from exposure to violence and harmful content on internet and social media. He further men must seek personal help to change harmful behaviours such as alcohol and

ecember 1st, World Aids Day 34 years since this day was first commemorate, people around the world unite to show support for people living with HIV and to remember those who have died from AIDS-related illnesses.

Today, we rededicate ourselves to the rapid and total eradication of HIV Aids with the knowledge that we can win this fight.

On the 1st December 2022 Ntabeni Clinic and Margate Clinic joined the world by celebrating this day respectively. The aim of the event was to support people living with HIV and remembering the lives of people died of HIV.

The objective was to encourage people to know their status and to motivate those who know their status to take treatment and keep them on treatment. Making people aware of preventive measures available in the public facilities and also promoting condom use and PREP HIV can be transmitted via the exchange of a variety of body fluids from infected people, such as blood, breast milk, semen and vaginal secretions. HIV can also be transmitted from a mother to her child during pregnancy and delivery. Individuals cannot become infected through ordinary day-to-day contact such as kissing, hugging, shaking hands, or sharing personal objects, food or water.

It is important to note that people with HIV who are taking ART and are virally suppressed do not transmit HIV to their sexual partners. Early access to ART and support to remain on treatment is there
fore critical not only to improve the health of people with HIV but also to prevent HIV transmission.
