World Hand Hygiene Day is celebrated every year on 5 may. The primary objective of it is to mobilize people around the world to increase adherence to hand hygiene in health care facilities, thus protecting health care workers and patients from infections. The theme for 2023 was "Accelerate action together –save lives clean your hands".

Townhill hospital campaign was divided into two categories. Day one was dedicated specifically to all Townhill hospital patients and day two focused on health care workers. 
advising our staff members about the importance funeral cover and various options that are available.
