



1. Feedback on knowledge gained and clinical observation:
 - a. Ask the participants whether they have each completed the clinical observation exercise? (They must have completed each clinical observation by the end of the Well baby component)
 - b. Ask the participants about anything new they have learnt?
 - c. How did the practice in your hospital compare with what was taught?
 - d. Average the scores from each participant in order to assess the general compliance of your hospital. (Can be completed once all observations have been submitted).
2. Comments on videos: Ask the participants for their impressions of what they saw in the video.
3. Link to KZN tools:
 - a. Review the multiple guidelines, clinical records and audit tools relating to ongoing care included in the Participant resources.
 - b. Are these all in use in your facility and are participants familiar with their contents?
 - c. Are at risk newborns identified using page 3 of the Neonatal Record (Congratulations)?
 - d. Have you considered introducing the Family monitoring tool in your facility?
4. Questions:
 - a. What quality gaps have you identified in ongoing care for well and at risk newborns in your hospital? What are your concerns and possible solutions?
 - b. Are at risk newborns monitored with their mothers in post natal ward?
 - c. Are you able to identify and manage well newborns with physiological jaundice in the post natal ward? If not-how could this be strengthened?
 - d. How do you prepare mothers for discharge or transfer?
 - e. How can you strengthen CCG linkage for all newborns?
5. Take home messages: Ask participants what are their take home messages? Share the following if they have not been raised:
 - a. All at risk babies need close monitoring. This is best done skin to skin with their mother.
 - b. Breast feeding support
 - c. Good education on eye and cord care will prevent complications like sepsis.
 - d. Before discharge or transfer please ensure that the family has been informed, and the details of follow up have been explained.
 - e. Mothers are key partners in the ongoing monitoring and care of newborns. (Side by Side Campaign). They need to be supported and empowered to care for their baby and identify danger signs at home. The Road to Health and Family monitoring books are essential tools to support families with ongoing care.
6. Role play:
 - a. Use the role play instructions that contain the scenario and possible questions and answers.
 - b. You will need :
 - A mannikin
 - KMC wrap and cap
 - Thermometer and stethoscope
 - Neonatal Record and Family monitoring tool.
